Firstly, I'd like to take this opportunity to welcome you to this spring edition of About Watford.

This is an exciting time for Watford. This council is working hard to deliver improvements to our town, whilst keeping council tax low and providing the first class services that residents expect. That's why I was pleased to pass my first budget recently which committed the council to doing just that. Despite a 70% cut in our funding from central government over the last 10 years, we have worked hard to protect frontline services and invest in improvements to the town. This year's budget means that we can bring exciting new facilities to Oxhey Park, build new council homes for local families and deliver better public transport.

On pages 6 and 7, you can read more about the much-needed improvements to public transport that are coming down the track, which I promised during the election. These include a long awaited upgrade to Watford Junction, with changes to the current station concourse and other station facilities, to make it a more attractive welcome to the town for the 9million passengers who use it every year. We are also making good progress on a new bike hire scheme and bus service for Watford which we will be launching later this year. At a time in which our town is growing, we need to make sure that we have the public transport to match.

We're also working on improvements to our parks to make them even better. Last year was a record breaking one for Cassiobury Park, with numerous awards and the most visitors we have ever had. To crown this off, it was also voted one of the top 10 most popular parks in the country. In addition to what is on offer in Cassiobury Park, on pages 12 and 13 you can read about the plans for fantastic new facilities at Oxhey Park North. These improvements include a new riverside café and terrace, a new play area and new facilities for BMX biking, rollerblading, skateboarding and other wheeled sports. This scheme will provide a family friendly facility that anyone in our town can enjoy. Work is starting on this in April and I can't wait to see the finished result next year!

As always, we will have lots of great events going on across the town, particularly over the Easter holiday period. You can read more about this in the What's On section on pages 28 and 29.

The future is looking bright for Watford

Watford Borough Council has ambitious plans for 2019, including multi-million pound regeneration schemes and an on-demand bus service.

These will make Watford an even more attractive town to live, work, visit and invest in, as well as a more sustainable one. Here are just some of the big upcoming projects we are planning this year.

First impressions matter: breathing new life into Clarendon Road

Working closely with Watford Business Improvement District (BID), Hertfordshire County Council and Hertfordshire Local Economic Partnership (LEP), we have identified a prime opportunity to upgrade and revitalise Clarendon Road - a major walking route and employment zone linking Watford Junction and the town centre - and the surrounding areas.

As you may have already noticed, work has begun to improve the junction of Clarendon Road and Beechen Grove in Watford. This first piece of work includes resurfacing the road and pavements and improving the crossing over Beechen Grove for both pedestrians and cyclists. It will be completed by late April this year.

There will be times during the work when vehicle lane closures will be necessary and near the end of the programme, some overnight road closures will enable resurfacing to be completed but we'll make sure you're always kept up to date. To help create a sense of arrival for the millions coming through Watford Junction every year, a whole host of major improvements will take place until March 2025. Clarendon Road is set to be transformed! We'll keep you posted on what you can expect from these massive upgrades.

All aboard! Watford Junction to receive muchneeded makeover

The station - which currently welcomes a whopping 9million visitors every year - will be brought into the 21st century by Watford Borough Council alongside its partners: Halkin, Network Rail, London North Western Railways and Hertfordshire County Council.

To create an exciting and vibrant quarter around the town's main station, plans include a new entrance to improve customer flows, new shopping facilities, new bus stops, better walking routes and a brand new connecting bridge.

Plans also include a second entrance to the station and a new ticket hall to banish those long queues at the ticket barriers, a new bus station for the town and a multistorey car park for station users.

The route to transformation

- Phase 1 New entrance and ticket hall, and retail and refreshment outlets
- Phase 2 Development of the bus station
- Phase 3 Development of 350 new homes, new offices and new retail space





Keeping Wat

One of the biggest challenges facing Watford is providing new housing for our growing population. As well as ensuring that the right homes are built in the right places, Elected Mayor Peter Taylor has pledged to improve transport in the town to support growth. This year, two of his major transport initiatives are set to launch.

New healthy and cheap ways to travel in Watford

Two exciting proposals to encourage sustainable transport in Watford will allow residents to climb aboard a flexible on-demand bus service or hop on and off at Watford's cycling docks. Both of the proposals are part of Elected **Mayor Peter Taylor's aim to** improve public transport across Watford.

- The bike share scheme will be open to the public, with cycles available for hire on-street, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There are currently 25 schemes across the UK.
- The flexible on-demand bus service runs via an app. Simply book your ride share to pick you up at a 'virtual' stop and it will drop you at your destination. The app combines passenger requests and determines the most efficient route at a fixed fare. The scheme already runs successfully in Oxford, Sittingbourne and Liverpool.

Sports stars attend opening of refurbished leisure centres

Legends from football and athletics recently helped to celebrate the official opening of the town's refurbished leisure facilities.

Watford Borough Council, in partnership with Everyone Active, began a £1.8million refurbishment of its two leisure centres in August 2018.

To celebrate the completion of the project, Watford, Liverpool and England legend, John Barnes, officially opened Watford Leisure Centre Woodside and Olympic silver medallist, Colin Jackson, cut the ribbon at Watford Leisure Centre Central. Residents met the sporting heroes and were also able to take advantage of a number of free activities running over the open weekend in the new look facilities, such as free swimming, gym challenges, group exercise classes and bouncy castles.

Customers are now able to enjoy larger gyms with state-of-the-art equipment, a brand new toning suite and new virtual group cycling classes.

What's changed at Watford Woodside Leisure Centre?

Visitors will have noticed that it's easier to book onto popular group exercise classes thanks to the installation of a dedicated group cycling studio, as well as an extension to the current fitness studio.

New screens have been introduced, allowing for more than 40 additional virtual cycling classes to be hosted every week across three studios. Combined with the increased capacity of the existing studio, these changes will lead to better access to a wider range of classes, with less time spent on waiting lists!

The gym changing rooms at Watford Woodside have also received a makeover. The bigger space and modern fittings make it a more welcoming space for everyone.

What's changed at Watford Central Leisure Centre?

Similarly, customers at Watford Central are benefiting from new virtual cycling equipment in the group exercise studios. Again, this has allowed the centre to host a

variety of new classes and cater for the growing demand for group fitness.

Managing your money wisely is so important for the future of our council and our town.


Even at a time of big cuts in council finances from central government, we've made sure Watford Borough Council's share of council tax will rise below inflation. To put that into context, that's just 11p a week for a house in Band D. I'm really pleased that this is the lowest increase in council tax anywhere in Hertfordshire.

This is only possible because in Watford we have managed our finances prudently over many years. We are always working to find innovative ways to make sure that we can deliver first-class services, continue to improve the town and avoid the cuts being made by so many other councils.

We'll continue to provide the services that you rely on. That means bringing more of our award winning parks up to Green Flag standard, more free Big Events and providing even better leisure facilities. This year, I'll also be delivering a new bike hire scheme and bus service, improving our public transport and making Watford a more sustainable town. We'll also be working on building new council homes. This will help put a permanent roof over the heads of local families who really need it the most.

I'm pleased that we have been able to keep council tax rises low and provide investment in local services for everyone in Watford.

Budget plans for 2019/20




The charge for council tax

Council tax is set annually, and the money you pay is used to fund local services provided by Hertfordshire County Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner for Hertfordshire, as well as Watford Borough Council. We collect council tax for all three but each authority is responsible for deciding its own charge.

Of the total council tax collected, we receive around £8.8million, meaning that 15p in every £1 you pay goes towards the services Watford Borough Council provides. Not all the money we spend on our services comes from council tax, central government covers the payment of housing benefit which goes directly to the people who need it, and we receive income from other sources.



Oxhey Activity Park: play, sport, relax

We're bringing exciting new sport, play and leisure facilities to Oxhey Park. The new facilities will be open in May 2020 - here's a snapshot of what's planned.

Go wild and get fit at Oxhey Activity Park

An adventurous new toddler and junior play area is opening! Your little ones can discover the play trails, swing on the jungle swing like a modern-day Tarzan, roll down the grassy mounds, zoom down the slides or just enjoy being pushed on the swings. And to make sure everyone can join in the fun, most of the equipment is ideal for children with disabilities. Keen to brush up on your table tennis skills? No problem! Outdoor tables will also be available around the play area - free of charge. Just bring along some bats and a ball (and maybe a bandana if you're feeling serious).

To complete the scene, seating and picnicking spots are sprinkled throughout the play space, so you can keep an eye on the children and the table tennis score whilst tucking into your sarnies.

Testing your skills out at the new skate park

Roll up to the new skate park if you're after a good mix of street obstacles, as well as a wide mini ramp if you want some air time. The Plaza will be the destination of choice for street riders, with a range of facilities. The park will also include a bike pump track and smooth skate run, so people of all ages and abilities can work on their wheel skills.

A jump box section for the younger bike and scooter enthusiasts will enable them to

try out jumps and aerial tricks too. Plus, a separate learners' skate park next to the café will give absolute beginners the perfect spot to start honing their skills before they progress to other parts of the park.

New riverside café to cater for park-users

Bikers, sportspeople, walkers and busy parents will be able to relax with a drink and snack in the new riverside café. The café will serve a selection of lovely hot and cold food and drinks, to eat in or take away. On top of this, it's set to feature a meeting space that can be hired out for community use.

Wheels in motion for improved walking and cycling routes

Keen and amateur cyclists will be able to hop on their bikes and cycle around the new bike skills trail winding through the parkland. It comes complete with features made from natural materials to test balance and skills.

Whether you cycle to work or purely for pleasure, park-users can enjoy the new footpaths and cycle paths created to provide a safe route throughout the site. With connections to the existing National Cycle Route 6, which starts in London, passes through Watford and goes on to Luton, you can enjoy mainly traffic free cycle paths.

If you are new to cycling or need a refresher, then local community

cycle hubs can help you get started. Many will help with bike repairs, selling refurbished bikes and coordinating local rides. For more information, visit spokesgroup.org.uk or watfordcyclehub.org.uk

Every winter, we work with local homelessness charity New Hope to introduce Severe Weather Emergency Protocol (SWEP) to ensure that shelter is provided for people who are sleeping rough in Watford when temperatures dip below zero.

This winter we partnered with New Hope to upgrade the town's cold weather programme to SWEP+. With the support of St Mary's Church, Wellspring Church and One YMCA, we provided shelter for rough sleepers every night in December 2018 until the end of March this year, no matter what the temperature.

Elected Mayor of Watford Peter Taylor said: "This service not only provides a bed for the night, but also access to the fantastic services that New Hope provides. We will continue to do everything we can to support those sleeping rough in our town."

Elected Mayor and PCC visit Chessbrook Education Support Centre

Elected Mayor Peter Taylor and Police and Crime Commissioner David Lloyd visited Chessbrook Education Support Centre to learn more about a new scheme to educate Watford students about youth and knife crime.

Watford's Community Safety Partnership (CSP), Safer Watford, is working with local schools - including Chessbrook - to develop an educational package to divert young people away from gang culture, as well as reducing offending.

This is part of a wider strategy, involving Hertfordshire Constabulary and other CSPs in Hertfordshire, which will identify young people most at risk and provide targeted support.

Elected Mayor Peter Taylor said: "Working closely with schools, the police and local groups we are helping vulnerable young people

and making sure that they are not drawn into crime. This bold scheme is Watford at its best. bringing together many Watford organisations. I'd also like to thank local businesses who are putting in funding to support this work."

Watford Chief Inspector Matt

Phillips added: "Working with our CSP partners, we will be able to identify those most at risk of being drawn into this pervading culture and prevent their involvement through education and diversionary activities, making Watford - and indeed Hertfordshire - a safer place to live."

Were you warm over winter?

In the cold months it's good to know there's extra help available to stay warm for those who need it.

Most of us can deal with the cold and damp by turning up the heating so our homes stay cosy, whatever the temperature outside. But for some, colder weather can bring real problems. There is help available for those who need it. Herts Warmer Homes, in partnership with Hertfordshire County Council, offers free and subsidised grants for home insulation, some boiler replacements and repairs as well as providing emergency heaters.

Watford Borough Council commits to reducing plastic usage

It's official, we're phasing out single use plastics! We've already started to make progress at the Town Hall and with our partners Everyone Active and Veolia.

Over the next year you'll see more drinking fountains springing up in Watford's parks to encourage people to ditch expensive plastic bottles of water in favour of reusable bottles.

Elected Mayor of Watford Peter Taylor said: "I want Watford to be a greener, more sustainable town. And I know that residents, businesses and local organisations in Watford are keen to phase out the use of unnecessary plastics. So I'm making sure we push on with this important work."

Remember your reusables!

Keep your eyes peeled for a new campaign led by Hertfordshire WasteAware Partnership and supported by Watford Borough Council. The campaign aims to raise awareness about the importance of sticking with reusables when you're out and about. Items such as reusable cups, water bottles and bags should be part of your daily routine.

Recycle right this year

When you're recycling plastics always remember the scrunch test - if the item bounces back when you scrunch it, it cannot be recycled, so make sure it goes into your black bin.

Unfortunately, items such as polystyrene, soft plastics such as carrier bags, crisp packets, cling film, chocolate bar wrappers

and salad bags cannot be recycled in your blue-lidded bin. Find out what can go in your recycling bin at: watford.gov.uk/ blueliddedbin

Remember to always recycle right - empty any liquid and rinse out any food or drink residue before putting it in your blue-lidded bin. Bins that contain the wrong items will not be emptied. Items such as plastic bags, hangers and

polystyrene cannot be recycled and should go in your black-lidded bin.

Don't forget to also put your bins out for collection the night before or by 6am on your collection day and return them to your property boundary within 24 hours of collection.

Save time, do it online

You can now manage your council tax and benefits online by signing up for a My Watford account.

By signing up for an account at my.watford.gov.uk, you can see how much council tax you owe, details of payments you've made and dates when payments are due. Plus, you can save the bother of filing and see all your previous bills and letters which have been sent to you.

If you're claiming benefits, an online account will also be a huge time-saver. At the click of a button you'll be able to see information on your next payment, as well as all the information we hold about you and your household.

This means you can check and update your details anytime. For landlords receiving housing benefit payments directly, a My Watford account will let you see how much housing benefit has been paid and when you can expect the next payment.

Watford businesses can also take advantage of having an account, which will let you keep an eye on where you are with your business rates payments.

Make a change for the better: pay by direct debit and get your bills by email

26,572 people in Watford are now signed up to pay their council tax by direct debit and get their bills by email. We're asking as many people as possible to join them.

Signing up is completely secure and takes just five minutes, saving you the hassle of having to remember to pay every month and file your bills. Simply go to my.watford.gov.uk to register for an account and sign up to these services.

Every month, an average of almost 2,000 people forget to pay their council tax on time,

which is no surprise given how busy life is. But this means that every year council tax payers' money goes into sending out reminders.



Don't delay: Register to vote today

Make sure you don't miss your chance to vote in the borough ward elections in May.

There's little more than a month left to register to vote if you want to have your say in our borough ward elections on Thursday 2 May 2019.

Voting will take place on Thursday 2 May, but don't wait until then to check you are eligible to take part in the poll. By now you'll have received a household notification letter from us listing everyone in your home who is eligible to vote.

If your name isn't listed, don't worry. Just head to gov.uk/ register-to-vote and follow the instructions before Friday 12 April **2019** and you'll still get the chance to vote in our ward councillor elections.

If you want to vote by post, we'll need to have received your application by 5pm on Monday 15 April 2019. Your poll card will be delivered around 23 March 2019 and includes a form to do this just fill it in and send it back to us.





Bring your poll card to vote

Watford is once again taking part in the government-led pilot scheme to make sure everyone who votes is who they say they are.



You'll have to show your poll card when you come to vote in our polling stations on Thursday 2 May 2019.

For the second year running, we're taking part in the voter ID pilot with 10 other local councils. This is looking at the best way to tackle possible election fraud by making sure that the person presenting themselves at the polling station to vote is who they say they are. This follows **Electoral Commission reports** that, nationwide, there has been a sharp rise in voter impersonation since 2014.

Nothing else will change - just remember to bring your poll card with you when you come to vote. Your poll card will be delivered around five weeks before electionday on 2 May, so keep it safe and bring it with you when you vote.

The first pilot in May 2018 was a huge success for Watford, with voter turnout reaching record

levels for the mayoral and local elections alone. 39.27% turned out to vote in the mayoral election, whilst 39.28% voted in the ward elections. On the day, only 42 people are known to have not voted because they did not have their poll card or alternative ID this is just 0.22% of the number of people who voted at polling stations.

If you don't receive your poll card by 1 April, contact Electoral Services at elections@watford. gov.uk or phone 01923 278369.

If you lose your poll card, bring along one of the following:

- Valid passport
- UK or EU photo card driving licence
- Biometric residence permit
- EEA Identity Card
- Northern Ireland Electoral **Identity Card**
- Photo card parking permit (issued as part of the Blue Badge scheme)

- Ministry of Defence Identity Card
- Concessionary travel pass funded by HM Government
- Oyster 60+ pass
- PASS scheme card

There will be no change to the way you vote if you have a postal vote.

We are taking part in this pilot to minimise fraud whilst keeping it simple for people to cast their votes without difficulty, as they did last year with Watford having the highest ever turn out for mayoral and local elections alone.

A garden oasis in Watford

Discover the exotic Cheslyn House and Gardens this spring

Often described as Watford's "hidden gem", Cheslyn House and Gardens is another of Watford's Green Flag Award winners. Its 3.5 acres of space is imaginatively laid out to invite exploration, providing a myriad of interesting areas including a pond, aviary, fernery and public art.

Designed by renowned architect
Henry Colbeck and his wife,
Daisy, the original gardens
have a collection of unusual
and exotic plants which they
collected whilst travelling
the world. Among the special
delights you can still see today
are the whimsical sweet gum
tree, the handsome Indian bean
tree and the distinctive tulip
tree.

The council has maintained the site since 1965 and further developed the gardens by adding new features, such as the pond, a rock and gravel garden and large herbaceous borders. This has encouraged new wildlife to visit the gardens, including dragonflies, damselflies, frogs, newts, birds and water insects.

Beyond the house and open lawns, a paved pathway turns into a natural path for visitors to explore the semi-natural woodland, which is full of colour in spring when the azaleas and rhododendrons are in full bloom.

Our partner Veolia's expert gardener is often working in the gardens and is happy to share his vast knowledge with visitors, so do stop and say hello if you see him.
